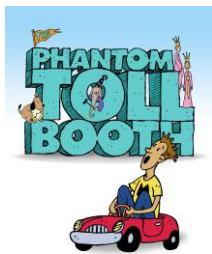
John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, DC

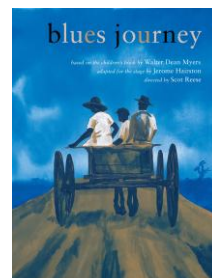

**TEACH ART FOR ITS OWN SAKE, RESEARCHERS SAY**

Two researchers who found that art classes don't improve overall academic performance nonetheless advocate strongly on behalf of arts education in a new book, *Studio Thinking: The Real Benefits of Visual Arts Education*. "The arts need to be valued for their own intrinsic reasons," said Ellen Winner of the Harvard Graduate School of Education, one of the authors. "...[A]ny superintendent is going to say, 'If the only reason I'm having art is to improve math, let's just have more math.'"

**NOT BY GEEKS ALONE**

In this Wall Street Journal commentary, Diane Ravitch and Chester Finn note that America's competitive edge depends in large measure on how well our schools prepare tomorrow's workforce. Noting new funds and attention on STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math), the authors note that STEM skills ignore at least half of what has long been regarded as a "well rounded" education in Western civilization: literature, art, music, history, civics and geography.

**K-12 SPENDING MORE RELIANT ON FEDERAL GOVERNMENT SINCE NCLB**

New data from the National Center for Education Statistics show that the federal government has been playing a continually larger role in K-12 education since 1999 and the January 2002 passage of the No Child Left Behind Act. The new statistics include detailed financial data about school districts across the nation for the 2004-05 school year. Five years earlier, during the 1999-2000 school year, public school districts received an average of \$578 per pupil from the federal government. By 2004-05, that number had risen to \$919.

**SENATE APPROVES INCREASE FOR NEA FY 08 APPROPRIATIONS**

The Senate Appropriations Committee has approved a \$9 million increase to the NEA, but the Senate Interior Appropriations Bill has yet to move to the Senate Floor for a vote. On June 27, the U.S. House of Representatives approved a \$35 million increase for the National Endowment for the Arts. If the full Senate takes up the Interior spending bill, and approves the \$9 million recommended by the Appropriations Committee, then the difference between the House-approved \$35 million and the Senate-approved \$9 million would have to be worked out in conference committee. Another scenario includes many of the major spending bills being rolled into one large Omnibus Bill later this fall, which would also likely include an NEA appropriation at the Senate level or somewhere between the House and Senate levels.

**EDUCATING THE PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATES**

In their first seven debates, Democratic and Republican presidential candidates had relatively little to say to most viewers about education. Education is falling off the nation's priority list, writes Arthur Levine in *Education Week*. During the 2000 presidential election, Americans ranked education either first or second among the nation's priorities. In 2004, it fell to fifth. According to Levine, the national education media and the independent sector (nonprofit organizations) have a crucial role to play in getting candidates to articulate -- and helping to delineate -- their positions on education.

**U.S.E.D. ARTS IN EDUCATION FUNDING**

When Congress returns from recess, it will work to wrap up final FY08 funding decisions. For the first time in seven years, the House has recommended including arts in education funding in the budget for the U.S. Department of Education. On June 7, House funding for the Arts in Education programs was approved with a \$3.5 million increase over last year's funding level. The Senate has also supported arts education, with a \$1 million increase. Both the House and Senate bills also include funding for much-needed research regarding the status of arts education in our nation's schools.
