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ASSESSMENT IN THE ARTS, PART I: CREATING RUBRICS TO PROMOTE LEARNING

Workshop Leader: Deborah Brzoska

For Teachers of Grades K-12 and Artists Interested in Assessing Student Learning in the Arts

3 hours of instruction time

Maximum number of workshop participants: 40

The current emphasis on assessment holds exciting prospects for arts education, and raises questions about scoring and providing feedback to students on their work. In this workshop, participants use actual student work samples to develop criteria for assessing student work in dance, drama, music, and the visual arts. Participants also explore how to involve students, artists, teachers, and community members in the process.

Note: This workshop serves as an excellent introduction to assessment in the arts, followed by two additional arts assessment workshops for those who wish to go further: **Assessment in the Arts, Part II: Assessment Design** and **Reflective Practice: Looking Together to Assess Student Work in the Arts**.

ASSESSMENT IN THE ARTS, PART II: ASSESSMENT DESIGN

For Teachers and Artists who have taken *Assessment in the Arts: Creating Rubrics to Promote Learning*

3 hours of instruction time

Maximum number of workshop participants: 40

This workshop builds on arts assessment strategies learned in the *Assessment in the Arts: Creating Rubrics to Promote Learning* workshop, allowing participants to design and refine specific arts assessment tasks for use in their own classroom or district. Participants may bring samples of arts assessments and student work to the workshop for analysis and revision. Current research, resources, and examples of performance assessments and scoring rubrics in the arts will be shared.

Note: This workshop may be combined with the **Creating Rubrics** workshop to provide a six-hour experience for participants.

REFLECTIVE PRACTICE: LOOKING TOGETHER TO ASSESS STUDENT WORK IN THE ARTS

For Teachers of Grades K-12, as well as Administrators, Arts Specialists, and Artists

3 hours of instruction time

Maximum number of workshop participants: 40

Like the art critic, arts teachers are called upon daily to observe, interpret, and assess student work in the arts. Facilitated conversations about student work in the arts can be an important tool for assessment. In this workshop, participants learn how to facilitate conversations among teachers that will help them look more deeply, share more openly, and gain reflective skills to improve teaching and assessment in the arts. This workshop serves as an effective follow-up to "Assessment in the Arts, Part II: Assessment Design."

DEBORAH BRZOSKA, a former dancer and choreographer, is a recognized leader in arts education who works with teachers and artists across the country in arts curriculum, assessment, research and professional development. Currently, she is guiding action research efforts for The Kennedy Center as well as four federally-funded arts research and dissemination projects, including innovative programs in Hawai'i. Ms. Brzoska is the founding principal of an award-winning arts-based public school in Vancouver, Washington and works nationally to help others develop exciting arts-based schools and sound arts instructional practice.

DESIGNING ARTS-CENTERED INTERDISCIPLINARY CURRICULUM

For Teachers of Grades 3-12, as well as Administrators, Arts Specialists, and Artists

3 hours of instruction time

Maximum number of workshop participants: 40

The arts can strengthen and unify curriculum in today's schools, bringing together previously isolated information into rich interdisciplinary learning. In this workshop, participants explore how the Vancouver School of Arts and Academics for grades 6-12 (Vancouver, Washington) has selected works of art which lend themselves to interdisciplinary, school-wide, thematic instruction. Participants discover the value of teacher teams, thematic instruction, and community arts resources in efforts that can result in total school reform. They also learn how to plan, schedule, and restructure schools through the arts.

CREATING INTERDISCIPLINARY UNITS BASED ON THE PERFORMING ARTS

For Teachers of Grades K-12, as well as Administrators, Arts Specialists, and Artists

3 hours of instruction time

Maximum number of workshop participants: 40

Effective interdisciplinary instruction can help teachers meet the challenges of standards, assessments, and curriculum. Participants analyze an example of an arts-based interdisciplinary unit: how the life and works of American choreographer Alvin Ailey link history, culture, and language arts to life. Participants also learn how to analyze dance as a performing art and to effectively connect the arts to other classroom subjects. Instructional resources are shared, along with ideas for student projects and assessment.

Note: This workshop is an effective follow-up to the **Designing Arts-Based Interdisciplinary Curriculum** workshop.

ARTS INTEGRATION: THE KENNEDY CENTER'S APPROACH

For Administrators, Arts Specialists, Teaching Artists, and Teachers of All Grade Levels

Many of the Kennedy Center's professional development offerings are based on a philosophy and practice of teaching called arts integration. So what is arts integration?
