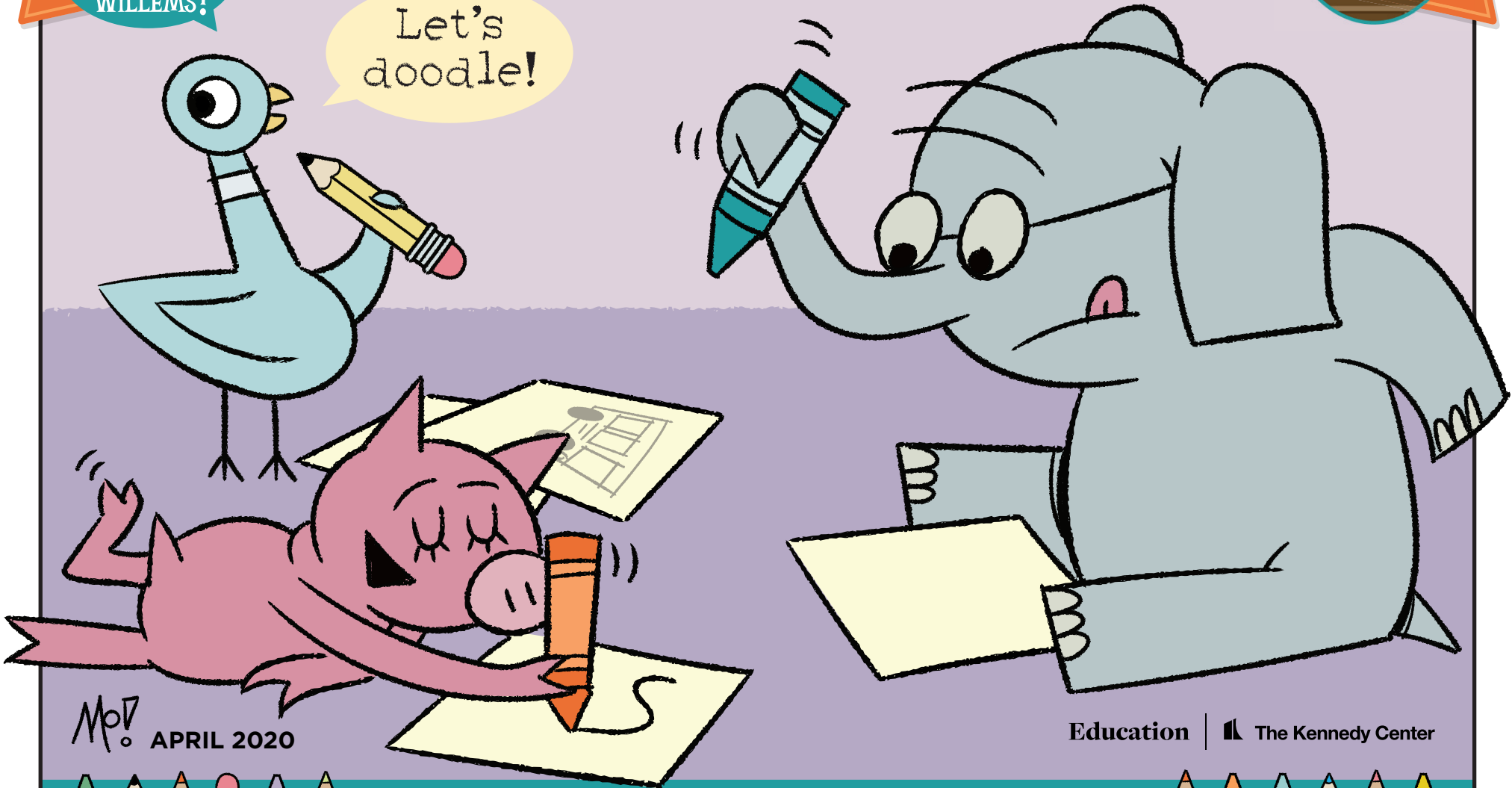

DRAW THE PIGEON IN 9 STEPS!


YOU WILL
NEED:





1.  Start with a big letter *O*. (It appears in words like “Mo”!)

2.  Now draw a smaller letter *O* inside of it. (You’ve drawn a doughnut.)

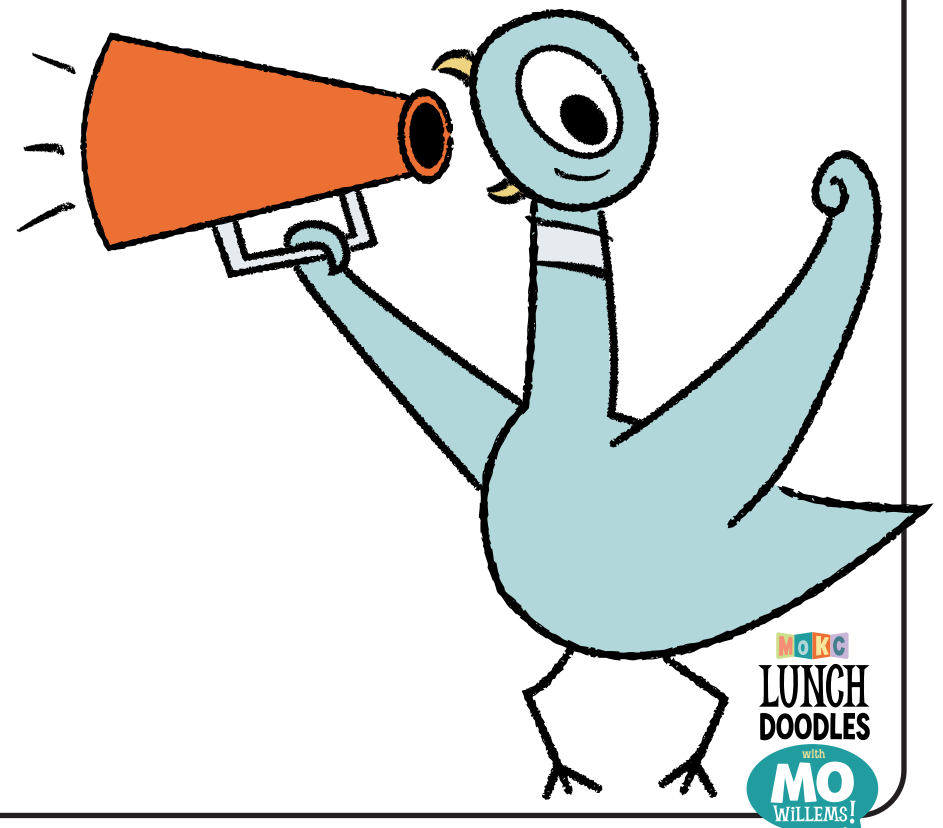
3.  Next, you have a choice between two letters—*M* or *W*—but draw the letter on its side.

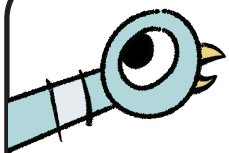
4.  We’re going to place the eye next, which is the most important part of the drawing, because the eye shows how the character is feeling. Make sure to darken it in. (You always look at the darkest part of a drawing first!)

5.  Draw two lines going straight down for the neck.

6.  Next, draw two lines across the neck for the collar.

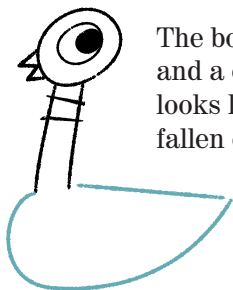

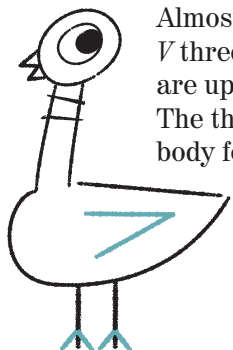
The body is a circ-angle—a triangle and a circle combined. (It kind of looks like an ice cream cone that's fallen over.)

The legs are two more lines straight down from the body. (Just like the neck!)

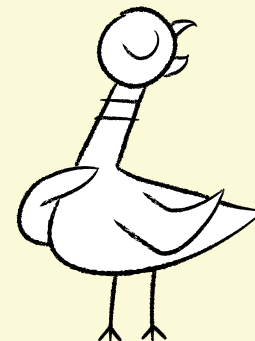
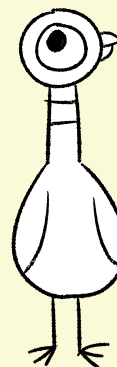
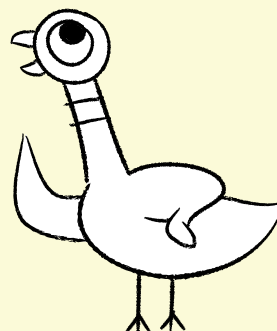
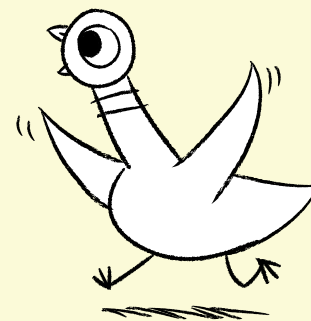
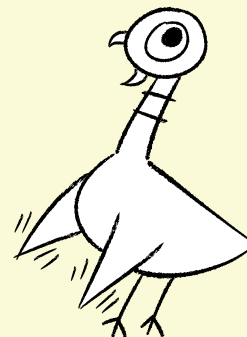
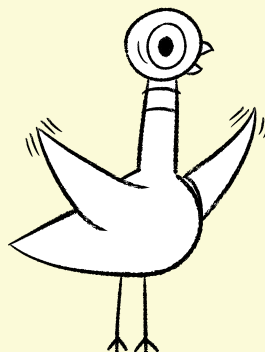


Almost done! Draw the letter V three times. The first two are upside down for the feet. The third is on its side in the body for the wing.

Try moving The Pigeon's beak, wings, eye, or legs to create lots of funny poses!



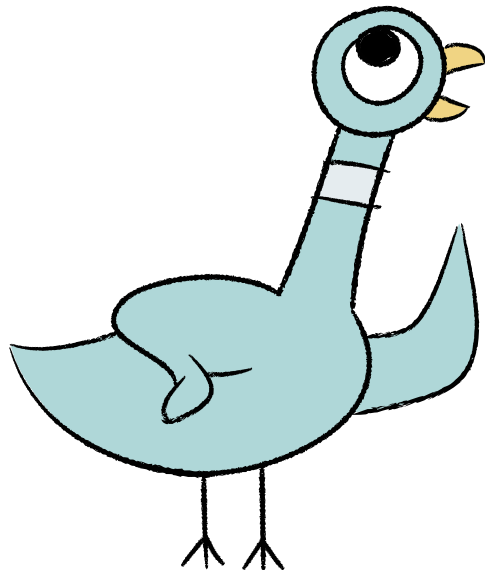

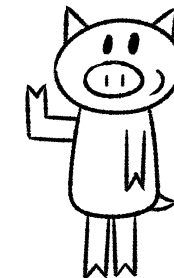
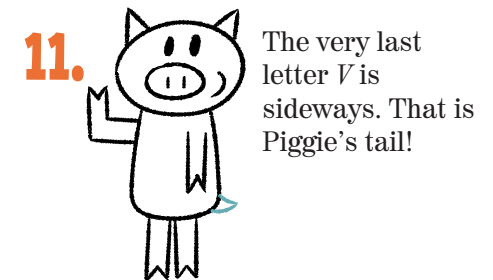
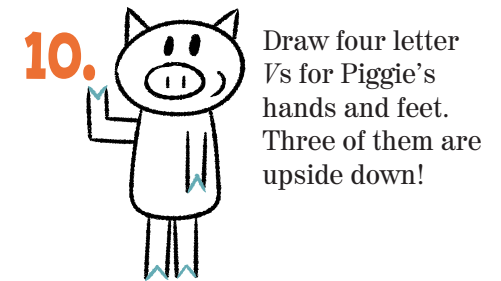
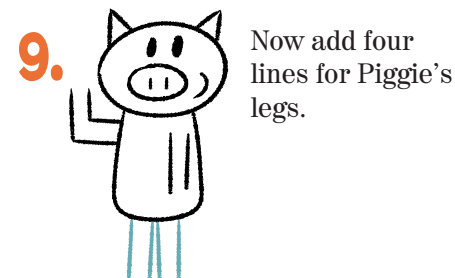
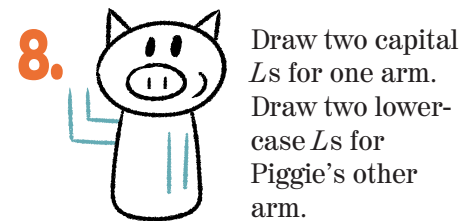
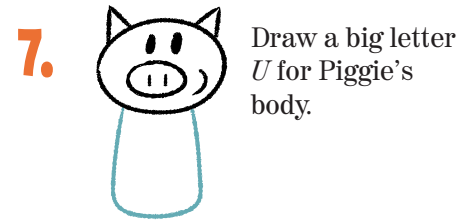


DRAW PIGGIE IN 11 STEPS!

YOU WILL NEED:



1.  First draw a Mo-val (a Mo-val is a circle that looks like an egg).
2.  Inside the Mo-val, draw a smaller Mo-val.
3.  Now draw the number 11 twice.
4.  Make the top number 11 bigger (like inflating a balloon).
5.  Next, take the letter *M* and cut it in half. Place each half on either side for Piggie's ears.
6.  Draw a backward letter *C*, or a sideways letter *U*, for Piggie's mouth.

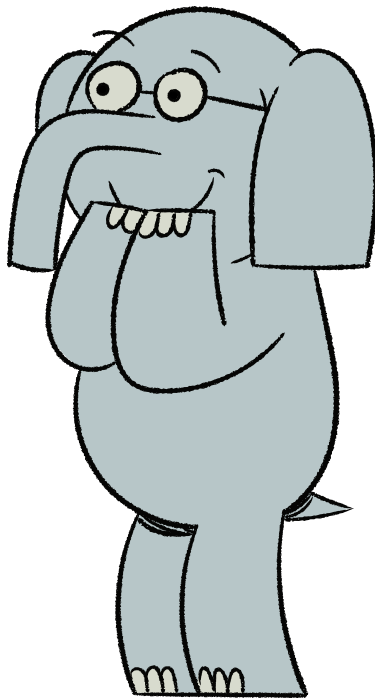
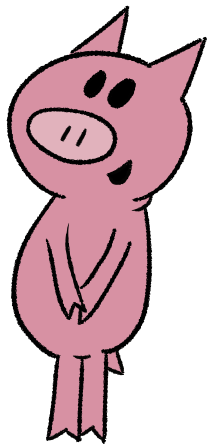

Start with Gerald's trunk. Draw two number 7s, one above the other. Then draw a line to close the bottom.

Draw a circle around Gerald's trunk for his face.

3.



Gerald needs glasses. Draw two circles for the frames. Then draw three straight lines to finish them.

4.



Now draw two dots for his eyes. He can see!

5.



Draw a sideways letter *C* or a letter *U* for Gerald's mouth.

6.



Draw a big letter *U* for Gerald's body.





7. The ears are squ-ovals (a squ-oval is a shape that is square on one end and round on the other).



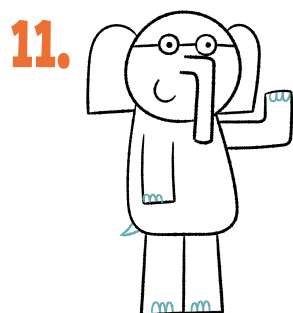
8. Draw two lowercase letter *l*s for one arm. Draw two sideways uppercase letter *L*s for Gerald's other arm.



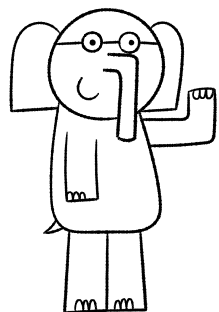
9. Add three lines for Gerald's legs.



10. Draw four straight lines to close the hands and feet.

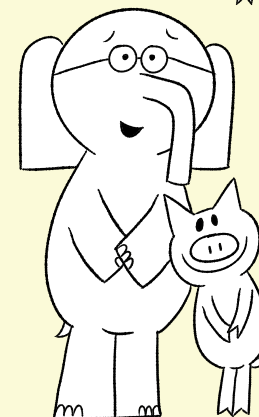
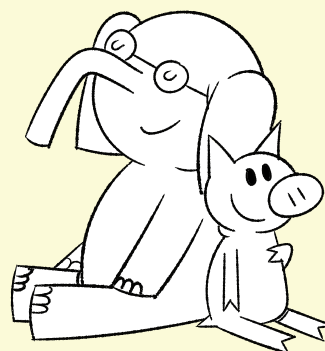
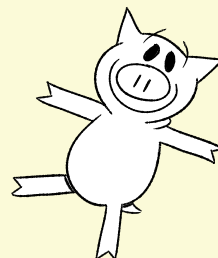
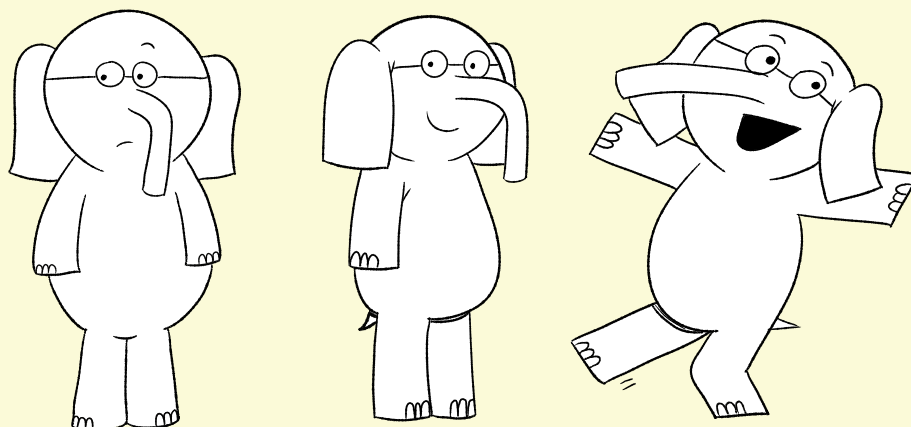


11. Add four letter *M*s with an extra hump for the fingers and toes. And one letter *V* for the tail!

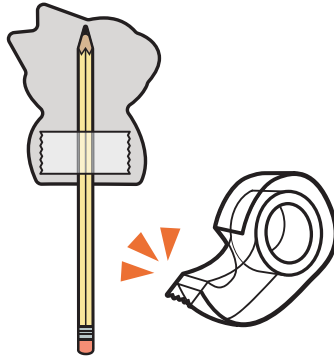


MAKE STICK PUPPETS IN 4 STEPS!

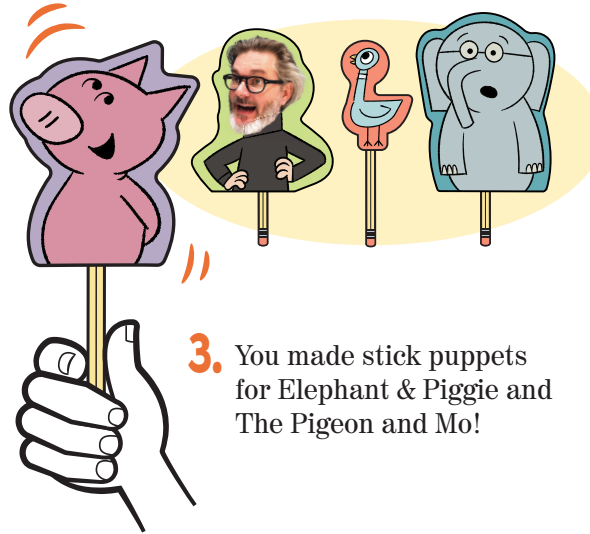

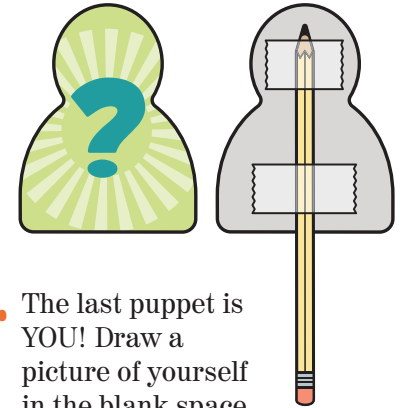
1. Cut out the pieces along the dotted lines.
