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The John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts announces the

Award and Scholarship Recipients of the 2020 Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival

Honoring Outstanding Student Achievement

Awards Were to Have Been Received at the National Festival in April 2020

(WASHINGTON)—The John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts today announced the national awardees of the Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival (KCACTF). Dozens of students received recognition of their outstanding work. These student artists from across the United States were recognized from the eight regional festivals that were held January 7 through February 27, 2020. More than 120 students were selected to travel to Washington, D.C. for an all-expenses paid trip to participate in National Festival events at the Kennedy Center, April 6–10, but the 2020 Festival was unfortunately later canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

"In this time of isolation, we are all examining the way forward as citizens, as friends, as loved ones, as both teachers and students, and as artistic collaborators who must face bigotry and racism's uncomfortable truths and, if nothing else, challenge our own professional ethics as artist educators if we are to make our work with any semblance of integrity." said Gregg Henry, Artistic Director of KCACTF. "It is in this context that I remember fondly the diverse range of work from these student artists that were showcased during the regional festivals. We are blessed by gifted students, and teaching artists nationwide making a very real impact through the work, day in and day out, using the arts to amplify necessary conversations and encourage change."

Normally, each April the Kennedy Center welcomes students from across the country to the KCACTF National Festival. The week-long festival includes opportunities for participants to take part in master classes and engage with colleagues and peers from across the nation and the Washington, D.C. theater community. Furthermore, students participate in a closing day ceremony for awards in production, directing, choreography, acting, playwriting, design, stage management, dramaturgy, and theater criticism.

The honors below represent the outstanding and distinguished achievement recognized by the KCACTF National Committee, Guest Artistic Director Sonja Parks, and the KCACTF National Office at the Kennedy Center. Said awards would have been received in person this past April during the National Festival.

ABOUT THE KENNEDY CENTER AMERICAN COLLEGE THEATER FESTIVAL

Envisioned in 1968 and launched in 1969 by Roger L. Stevens, the Kennedy Center's founding Chairman, KCACTF encourages and celebrates the finest and most diverse theatrical productions from colleges and universities nationwide. Through the regional and national festivals, KCACTF celebrates the achievements of theater programs, individual students, and faculty of colleges and universities throughout the United States.

The eight regional festivals provide opportunities for colleges and universities to showcase their finest work to diverse audiences of theater students and faculty from their regions. In addition to the invited productions, students and faculty attend workshops, master classes, juried design expositions, seminars, summer stock and graduate school auditions, and other professional development opportunities that build bridges between higher education and the professional theater community. In July 2014, the Eugene O'Neill Theater Center along with the Kennedy Center, National New Play Network, and Stage Directors & Choreographers Foundation announced the start of the National Directors Fellowship (NDF), a five-year joint initiative which will fast track the professional development of 25 early-career stage directors, five per year. As part of this yearlong fellowship, the fellows will attend the MFA Playwrights' Workshop and Directing Intensive, led by NNPN and KCACTF.

Since its establishment 51 years ago, KCACTF has reached millions of theatergoers and made important contributions to the professional development of countless college and university theater students nationwide. This year, eight regional festivals were hosted by the following institutions: Cape Cod Community College; University of Maryland, College Park; Madison College; University of South Carolina Upstate and Converse College; The City of Sioux Falls, South Dakota; The City of Abilene, Texas; Colorado State University; and California State University, Fullerton.
